RAP visits Unity College Murray Bridge

Murray Bridge Unity College high school students will confront the realities and responsibilities of driving when the Metropolitan Fire Service's (MFS) Road Awareness Program (RAP) visit on Wednesday, 4th May, 2016.

The MFS RAP will visit the school to present to the students during the morning of Wednesday, 4 May 2016 to reinforce the road safety messages.

MFS Station Officer Rod Campbell and road crash survivor Eli Murn will share their personal experiences of road trauma with local high school students. Eli was a promising sportsman who now lives with an acquired brain injury due to a road crash incident.

Eli now focuses on educating young drivers through the Road Awareness Program (RAP). His message is that just one risk on the road can have major consequences. "I'd like to make a *universe of positive* out of my personal negative," he said.

RAP Coordinator, MFS Station Officer, Rod Campbell said, "RAP can be confronting and hard-hitting yet is uplifting in its reinforcement of the message that we must look after our mates on the road."

"Another key message is that while we can choose to take a risk, we cannot choose its consequences. RAP leaves students feeling empowered to make positive changes on the roads by committing to safe driving," MFS Station Officer Campbell said.

The use of mobile phones by drivers and pedestrians will also be a focus of the program.

"The dangers of using a mobile phone while driving are very real. It has the potential to cause a driver to lose their own life or cause the loss of other lives, including those of their friends. Mobile phone use is one of the key road risks students will learn about," MFS Station Officer Campbell said.

The MFS Road Awareness Program was one of six category finalists in the 2016 Australian Road Safety Awards. MFS RAP team representatives received their Award from the Australian Road Safety Foundation in March this year.

The program's reach to Year 11 students across the state increased during 2014 and 2015 and with additional funding is branching out to engage in the business area.
