## Road Awareness Program visits *Victor Harbor and Clare* students

Monday, 17 September 2012

Surviving a road crash has had life-long effects for Eli Murn. Once a promising sportsman, Eli now has an acquired brain injury.

This week, Eli will share his story with licence aged drivers in ***Victor Harbor and Clare*** as part of the Metropolitan Fire Service's (MFS) **Road Awareness Program (RAP)**, to encourage local high school students to make better choices on the roads.

MFS Station Officer, Mark Haylock will co-present the programs with Eli, from the perspective of a firefighter who has more than 20 years of experience in extricating injured and deceased people from crashes.

Station Officer Haylock said "Eli's story is a very powerful one and connects with the students; he's a bright young man living with the consequences of one mistake."

"RAP teaches the students that while they can choose to take a risk, they cannot choose its consequences. The program is graphic, hard-hitting and emotional, yet leaves the students feeling empowered about their choices on the road and positive about looking after their mates," Station Officer Haylock said.

Of his road crash experience, Eli Murn said, "I'd like to make a universe of positive out of my personal negative."

RAP has received national praise after being delivered to the nation's future football and cricketing greats at the AFL Players' Association's and Australian Cricketers' Association's induction camps at the MCG in Melbourne.

Last year, the program's reach to Year 11 students across the state increased. A State Government funding boost allowed the MFS to appoint a second RAP presenter (firefighter), meaning more schools and students benefit from the program in city and regional areas.
